Section I: Political Participation

Do you self-identify as a Democrat? Why? (250 word limit)

I self-identify as an independent but share many beliefs in common with Democrats. Like Democrats, I believe that government should be used as a safeguard for the individual liberties of all people and never as an instrument to aggrandize power in the hands of a wealthy few. In addition, I share the goal of helping the less fortunate in our society by eliminating needless waste in city government to ensure our citizens are not excluded from economic opportunity because of administrative largess. Furthermore, I want to preserve our sacred Constitutional rights to gather, to be free from unlawful searches and seizures and to receive adequate due process of law. b.) What was the first Presidential election you voted in? Who did you vote for, and why? (200 word limit)

In 2004, I voted for John Kerry in my first presidential election. I supported Kerry because I saw the dangerous direction which President George W. Bush was taking our country by pursuing unconstitutional wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, and by leading the attack on our civil liberties through the USA Patriot Act. John Kerry vowed to take troops out of Iraq within six months of taking office and I admired his candid way of addressing the failed policies that were making America less safe and less free. By voting for Kerry I saw the possibility of ending the abuses in government that were shaking the foundations of our entire system of law and justice. John Kerry was not the perfect candidate and I certainly disagreed with him on several policies but his appeal as an anti-war, pro civil libertarian is what won my vote.

I do not often donate to political candidates or parties but have donated to two leading representatives in government, Ron Paul and Rand Paul. Because of their staunch anti-war positions and their willingness to address the social inequity created by our debt based, Federal Reserve run monetary system I donated to their respective campaigns. In 2008, I volunteered for Ron Paul and helped educate fellow University of Texas students about his unwavering support of the U.S. Constitution. In addition, I have donated to the non-profit political organization Texans for Accountable Government (TAG) with whom I am a member. I have also given donations to Amnesty International and Environment Texas in the past. I volunteer by participating in political action with TAG, often at the City Council level of government. Volunteering to serve as a citizen watchdog, I have extensively participated in City Council meetings and given informed testimony on issues dealing with corporate subsidies, police accountability, wasteful government spending and the preservation of Constitutional rights.

Section II: Issues

1. Growth *(courtesy of Capital City Young Democrats)* (250 word limit total) **a.) Is Austin's population increasing?**

Austin is experiencing a population increase and attracting new residents because of our overall strong economy and vibrant cultural scene.

b.) What, in your mind, is the <u>single</u> most important thing for the City Council to do in order to manage Austin's population growth?

How Austin currently manages growth through the use of incentive packages hurts our citizens by granting exclusive privileges to large corporations that are mostly never available to individuals or small businesses. The most important thing the City Council can do to responsibly manage our growth is to adopt a hands-off approach to economic development. This objective can be accomplished by ending corporate subsidies and tax rebates that unfairly direct the economy. Let us empower grassroots business to achieve success without the unfair influence of our city picking economic winners and losers.

c.) Do you support increased density in Central Austin, namely the area bounded by 2222 to the north, Oltorf to the south, I-35 to the east, and MoPac to the west?

The Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan proposes a regimen of massive corporate subsidy grants to developers for density projects with the assumption it will stimulate the economy and promote economic growth. I believe the incentive structure will only unfairly use tax dollars to finance special interest development that will cause increased gentrification and drive up the cost of living for all Austinites. Thus, I do not support efforts to use the City Council's power to create increased density in Central Austin.

d.) If yes to part c, what tools will you use to increase density? If no, why not?

I do not believe we need incentive tools to create density development. These policies force long term residents out of the city's core and override our citizens' desire for natural growth instead of accelerated, managed costly projects.

2. Power *(courtesy of Austin Environmental Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) Do you support the movement to generate Austin's power from 100% coal-free sources?

I support the general idea of weaning Austin off of coal sources of energy. However, because of our strained finances in Austin Energy and the threatening rate increases, we must be certain investing in more forms of renewable energy will not result in a new rate increase or new base fees. Let us move off coal but do so in a gradual and responsible manner.

b.) What is the best way to handle the City's stake in the Fayette Coal Plant? Pick one, explain your answer.

Do nothing.

At this time, the Fayette Plant provides 600 MW of power, a significant portion of Austin Energy's generated supply. Instead of pushing for immediate and complete divestment, for now I propose we investigate the feasibility of gradually reducing our ownership stake in Fayette. That way we are sure our actions to invest in renewable energy as opposed to coal are economically feasible and do not further increase rates on our residents.

3. Diversity (courtesy of Capital Area Asian American Democrats) (250 word limit)

Asian-Americans are the fastest growing ethnic group in Austin's population by percentage. Will you support the adoption of a comprehensive language access policy for all City of Austin departments and services, along the lines of the ordinance adopted in San Francisco?

The increasing ethnic diversity of Austin as witnessed by our booming Asian-American population is a terrific sign that Austin is becoming an internationally recognized city where languages other than English thrive. I believe it is important to accommodate the needs of individuals who do not speak English and if we can do more to hire staff who speak Asian languages in different departments it would be beneficial. However, I believe that a comprehensive language access policy in all departments would put too great of a burden on our already stretched budget. I cannot commit to supporting such a proposal at this time, but I would work with the City Manager's office to target hiring more bilingual staff.

4. Housing *(courtesy of Capital Area Progressive Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) What percentage of money in the upcoming 2012 City bond package should be dedicated to affordable housing, including PSH? Feel free to specify answers for a \$200M, \$300M, and \$400M bond, as the exact amount is yet to be determined.

It is highly unlikely I will support a November bond; bonds are loans that must be paid back with interest in the future. I do not support any percentage of funding for new affordable housing initiatives including PSH because our government is going bankrupt and we simply cannot afford to increase our funding obligations for affordable housing.

b.) In your opinion, what should be the City Council's commitment to providing affordable housing, and PSH in particular?

Our City should gradually reduce our commitment to affordable housing including permanent supportive housing. If we are able to end corporate welfare and excessive amounts of funds spent for dubious city projects like the Waller Creek Tunnel and Water Treatment Plant Four, more money will be available in the private sector to foster true economic growth and allow individuals currently in affordable housing to have access to improved job opportunities. Growing the real economy by cutting government waste and unfair incentive packages will keep Austin affordable.

5. SMD's (courtest of CAAAD and CAPD)

Do you support an all at-large system, a hybrid system, or an all-district system plus an at-large mayor? Please explain. (250 word limit)

I favor an all-district 10-1 system plus an at-large mayor. I believe that breaking down constituencies into smaller units will help provide more effective and responsive representation. By removing at-large elections, we can take the big money influence out of local elections and return power to neighborhoods and local segments of our community. Along with an all-district system, it is imperative that boundary lines are drawn

by a citizens' redistricting commission. This mechanism will serve as a check against the possibility of gerrymandered districts and will work to respect the political cohesion of historically aligned areas of the city.

a.) Yes or no: do you support putting a charter amendment on the November 2012 ballot to move Austin's municipal elections from May to November?

Yes, I support putting a charter amendment on the November 2012 ballot to move municipal elections from May to November. There has been great speculation over this measure's influence on increasing voter turnout. I believe that to truly get more people involved in city elections we must open up accessibility to City Council decision making to have our people actually feel they have a voice rather than just changing the election date. However, I do realize there is support out there for moving elections. I believe the voters of Austin should make this decision and I would support putting it on the ballot so they could do so.

b.) Do you personally support moving the Austin municipal elections from May to November? Why or why not?

I do not personally support moving municipal elections to November. I believe there is a good reason why municipal elections are held in May. Individuals and families only have a finite amount of time to devote to discussing and analyzing politics. In November, people are saturated with political advertising for statewide and federal offices that absorb attention and are driven by massive funding in comparison with local candidates. Having May elections helps to focus our community's attention on local politics, the realm in which citizens can actually have the most impact on influencing policy. Personally, I believe setting aside May exclusively for municipal elections allows for a greater concentrated focus on local races and fosters a more informed, involved voting populace.

I am proud of my pledge to move Austin beyond coal, and I favor divesting Austin's ownership in the Fayette coal plant and reinvesting our resources into Austin's clean energy future. If Austin moves beyond coal, we'll be the biggest city in the country to divest from a municipally owned coal plant. This will help establish our city as the Clean Energy Capital of the World and create good local green jobs.

Continuing to own the Fayette Power Plant will only continue to cost us in the long run. The cost of operating traditional fossil fuel plants are increasing, along with the cost to our public health. My wife is a nurse, and she sees how people are negatively impacted by pollution directly, and on a daily basis.

Our stake in the Fayette coal plant could be worth hundreds of millions of dollars, and if it's feasible, we should seize this opportunity. In addition to the environmental benefits of moving towards clean energy, I've heard from many constituents who are worried about the rising costs of energy in general, and I believe reinvesting our resources in energy efficiency, renewable sources and more will keep Austin affordable. Our churches, low-income households and senior citizens deserve energy efficiency rebates to help keep their energy costs affordable. I don't believe mothballing the plant is the most responsible thing to do because we have a responsibility to protect our ratepayers. As I've said all through our energy generation planning process, affordability is just as much of a priority as moving to a clean energy future; they must go hand in hand.

Yes. I am already on record as supporting this and believe this policy should have already been adopted.

We need to make serious investments in affordable housing, including Permanent Supportive Housing, in the 2012 bond initiative. What percentage of the total bond amount is comprised of affordable housing specific bonds should not be determined until all projects have been evaluated and the public input process has been completed. I fought for affordable housing in the last successful bond effort and I support a robust bond amount for affordable housing this time as well. In terms of PSH, we must do a better job supporting both PSH tenants and neighborhoods.

Do you support an all at-large system, a hybrid system, or an all-district system plus an at-large mayor? Please explain. (250 word limit)

I have long been a supporter of geographical representation and led the charge to create the current Charter Review Committee. I have heard from many people in favor of a several different plans (the charter revision committee was clearly divided on this issue) and I am waiting to make a final decision after the process has run it course. I have had many supporters advocate for a hybrid system combining at-large and single member districts and a 10 -1 plan. I am in favor of whatever SMD plan has the best chance of passing voter approval this November and given that this issue has failed to pass voter approval 6 times, I want to make sure every option is considered before I make a final decision. I am strongly in favor of some form of single member districts and have been for many years.

Yes.

I support pursuing real efforts for Austin to go coal-free, and it must be done carefully so as to avoid rate shock. A serious issue is that current ERCOT rules preclude Austin Energy from not operating the plant if its operation is required to meet system demands. If elected, I would work to take back from ERCOT control over our generating facilities. One thing Austin could do to reduce reliance on Fayette (and other coal-fired generation around the state) is to set an example with even more energy efficiency, demand reduction and renewables. Unfortunately city budgets over the last 3 years have reduced conservation rebates and incentives by 16% and local solar incentives by 55%. If elected, I would work to increase these programs.

Yes.

I support the largest amount possible for bonds for affordable housing but the exact amount is contingent upon the city's bonding authority and other obligations. I was part of Liveable City's effort to help create the coalition for the last affordable housing bond initiative, which was the first one ever passed in Austin.

Council has a commitment to build 350 units, but so only 175 have been built or are in process. They should meet their commitment and use the new bonds to build more to meet the tremendous need.

I have always favored SMD's and pushed an SMD election when I was on council. I have signed the petition for 10-1 and believe the organizers have done their homework and are gathering real support. I have also said if a serious alternative emerges, I will consider it and, as a leader, I will work to bring the parties together to try to assure the greatest success for passage of SMD's on the ballot.

What we learned with the last \$55M allocation from the 2006 bond package is that we went through that money relatively quickly. I support a doubling of our 2006 efforts and will support the request of the CDC in those efforts. Because the exact amount of our total bond package is yet to be determined, and because we have not yet seen the need in other areas of the city, there really is no way for me to provide an exact number and must reserve any final decision until it is adopted by council. Our commitment to providing affordable housing should be to stretch every dollar possible and ensure that we have coverage across the city. Our challenge is that when it comes time to providing affordable housing in a particular location, there are few neighborhoods or neighbors that are interested in actually having these projects in their neighborhood. We must continue to work on dispelling the myths of affordable housing and ensuring that ALL of Austin share in and understand the work that is necessary. I will continue in those efforts.

First and foremost, I support change. I've supported that change since before I took office in 2006 when I proposed a single member district charter amendment. b.) What was the first Presidential election you voted in? Who did you vote for, and why? (200 word limit)

The first vote I ever cast was for Jimmy Carter, in the 1976 California primary. In fall 1975, I had signed up for Birch Bayh, mostly because of his excellent record on labor issues; for a few bright, shining weeks, I could claim to be the Bayh statewide coordinator. I think this meant I was the only person in the State of California who knew who the heck Birch Bayh was. Birch dropped out early, and the race eventually narrowed to Carter and Mo Udall. Most of my friends were for Udall – a safer choice, given his long history in Congress. Nevertheless, I saw an opportunity to convert my Republican parents to the Democratic party by focusing on Carter's sincerity and southern accent (always helpful with my Missouri-born father). Carter also had an excellent environmental record as Georgia governor, had been a nuclear engineer in the U.S. Navy, and was a fresh face who could reasonably claim to be untainted by Potomac politics.

Jimmy didn't work out as well as any of us planned; experience counts, in politics no less than in any other job. But my parents voted for him, and – so far as I can tell – have stayed Democrats ever since. All things considered, I'm happy with my decision.

I donate to a wide variety of nonprofit organizations, and have devoted a lot of my time to the City of Austin and other local governments as unpaid consultant, commissioner, and most recently as unpaid City Council member. I've also donated to a variety of national Democratic campaigns, the Travis County Democratic Party, Annie's List, and other organizations that support progressive candidates.

Section II: Issues

1. Growth *(courtesy of Capital City Young Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) Is Austin's population increasing?

YES. We won't double in size over the next twenty years – those days are thankfully over – but we will continue to increase, probably at a much higher rate than most U.S. cities.

b.) What, in your mind, is the <u>single</u> most important thing for the City Council to do in order to manage Austin's population growth?

We need to grow smart, using our zoning and planning efforts to direct growth along transit corridors while maintaining the quality of life in our urban neighborhoods. To support this, we need to provide additional transit options (including bus rapid transit and rail), bike lanes, and sidewalks. The alternative – suburban sprawl – sacrifices our environment and increases costs to all of us.

c.) Do you support increased density in Central Austin, namely the area bounded by 2222 to the north, Oltorf to the south, I-35 to the east, and MoPac to the west?

YES, within limits. Growing from within (and reducing sprawl) is best for the environment, minimizing our carbon footprint and maintaining air and water quality. It also reduces the costs of infrastructure, since we pay for roads, water and sewer lines by the linear foot. It ensures that a wide variety of housing types are available; many new migrants to Austin are comfortable with townhouses, three-deckers, and other forms not readily available in Austin now. And, by reducing vehicle-miles traveled and increasing the potential for transit, it will improve traffic congestion. Current zoning already provides for sufficient increases in density to provide for thousands of new residents; the experience of other cities suggests that we can increase density considerably without sacrificing the current quality of life in our neighborhoods.

d.) If yes to part c, what tools will you use to increase density? If no, why not?

The city's best tools for increasing density are the transportation options that make it possible. In particular, we need to develop a regional rail system that doesn't cost too much and connects residents and jobs within the central city. Our primary challenges going forward are identifying where to get the money and how to operate the system. I believe Austin voters will support the system once we've worked these questions out.

2. Power *(courtesy of Austin Environmental Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) Do you support the movement to generate Austin's power from 100% coal-free sources?

YES, I envision a utility that no longer relies on the Fayette Power Project to supply Austin's electricity.

b.) What is the best way to handle the City's stake in the Fayette Coal Plant? Pick one, explain your answer.

- 1. Do nothing.
- 2. Sell the plant.

Retain ownership; do not operate plant. Other. (Please explain.)

I sponsored a resolution last September calling on AE to study the options for handling FPP and very much look forward to seeing the results of that study later this summer. Until that report is completed, I cannot commit to one course of action.

If the analysis supports my current understanding, I would choose #2, sell the plant. Austin Energy has a tremendous amount of equity built up in FPP and it is my fiduciary responsibility to the city's ratepayers and taxpayers to ensure we use those resources wisely. LCRA will have right of first refusal over AE's share in the plant and I understand that we cannot unilaterally choose to cease operations of our 50% ownership of units 1 and 2 without LCRA's consent. It may make more sense to sell our share and use the proceeds to fund our renewable energy and conservation programs, and build up our rate stabilization funds to help keep future rate increases as small as possible. While it is still a dirty power plant, FPP is one of the cleaner coal-burning plants in the state. If we can prevent the development of an entirely new coal-fired plant by keeping AE's share of FPP on- line, we would benefit both the environment and society.

3. Diversity *(courtesy of Capital Area Asian American Democrats)* (250 word limit) Asian-Americans are the fastest growing ethnic group in Austin's population by percentage. Will you support the adoption of a comprehensive language access policy for all City of Austin departments and services, along the lines of the ordinance adopted in San Francisco?

YES. Specifically, I support a policy that provides clear procedures for staff who need to access an interpreter, restricts the use of bystanders, minors and family members as interpreters, and designates a staff person as a language access liaison to oversee training and implementation. Everyone needs water, electricity, and public safety. Everyone needs access to city government, and language should be no barrier.

4. Housing *(courtesy of Capital Area Progressive Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) What percentage of money in the upcoming 2012 City bond package should be dedicated to affordable housing, including PSH? Feel free to specify answers for a \$200M, \$300M, and \$400M bond, as the exact amount is yet to be determined.

I believe a 2012 bond package may be premature. We haven't finished our bond projects from the last three bond packages. (We have over \$100 million left in unspent funds on transportation alone.) Other jurisdictions are also looking at bond proposals that will likely stretch Austin taxpayers considerably. Our bonds may be more likely to pass if we wait until 2013. If a bond program does move forward this year, I support bonds for affordable housing, including PSH. The amount would have to be balanced with all other needs; I can't give a percentage until I see the other needs.

b.) In your opinion, what should be the City Council's commitment to providing affordable housing, and PSH in particular?

I am fully committed to the provision of affordable housing, and believe it must be one of the Council's highest priorities. I support an affordable housing program that spreads affordable units, both rental and homeownership, all over town. This is one reason I support permanent supportive housing downtown. Land costs are higher in some parts of town, so this increases our costs; we need to strike a reasonable balance between the number of units built and geographic equity. I will support additional affordable housing money in the next bond election, in order to help us move towards this goal.

We also need to recognize that the price of housing responds to the laws of supply and demand, and to the costs of construction. Anything city government can do to move permits through the mill faster will reduce costs to buyers and renters. We cannot sacrifice legal requirements and housing standards, but we can dramatically improve efficiency by insisting on monthly reports (as we did in the 1990s) and ensuring that permitting departments have the resources they need to provide timely, accurate reviews.

5. SMD's (courtest of CAAAD and CAPD)

Do you support an all at-large system, a hybrid system, or an all-district system plus an at-large mayor? Please explain. (250 word limit)

The present system was born broken. We need a change and I've supported district representation since I came to Austin in the 1980s. I will, of course, support it again. But voters have turned down six proposals for change in a row, and my primary concern is that the next proposal actually *pass*. I will gladly support any politically viable proposal that will provide geographic representation. The Council needs to look like the public.

6. Election Dates *(courtesy of St. Ed's Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) Yes or no: do you support putting a charter amendment on the November 2012 ballot to move Austin's municipal elections from May to November?

YES. I don't believe the Council had the legal authority to move the election from May to November. The Charter requires a May election, and, under the Texas Constitution, a city charter can only be changed by city voters. (Even in Texas, the state legislature can't override the constitution.) Even if the legislature could have authorized us to override city voters and the charter, I don't think it's appropriate to extend my term by six months without voter approval. But it's perfectly appropriate for voters to decide this issue.

b.) Do you personally support moving the Austin municipal elections from May to November? Why or why not?

YES. It will increase voter turnout, and it will increase voter participation in public safety, water and electric power, parks and libraries, and other city functions and issues.

One of the clear patterns emerging from the bond advisory task force is that the needs of the city are great. And what has become apparent during my time on council, and in particular the last year, is that the need to maintain affordability has never been more challenging. My colleagues and I requested that the task force return with multiple scenarios so that we can better evaluate the marginal gain of a larger package. While I await those citizen recommendations, I will say that I would find it hard to support the high end of that range with significant tax implications.

b.) In your opinion, what should be the City Council's commitment to providing affordable housing, and PSH in particular?

Although I know the cost of housing is market driven, our population has doubled every twenty years. I want to encourage the building of more new homes in our City limits, especially in our desired development zone, out towards SH 130 and more dense housing in our urban core. Even though we are seeing an improvement in our economy we as City must still make sure that we maintain our quality of life and keep investing in infrastructure, transportation solution, and find more ways to partner with our development community to keep building. I want to make sure that we do not unnecessarily burden homeowners with fees and taxes that do not add value to their investment. I also want to find more ways to work with the middle-income residents in our city and use bond dollars to invest in our TOD's and downtown areas for ways to buy down market rate development and so our middle-income citizens can participate in our affordable housing program.

1. Growth *(courtesy of Capital City Young Democrats)* (250 word limit total) a.) Is Austin's population increasing?

The EPA also closed 4 coal-fired generators this year. Unfortunately there is no time or facilities to replace the lost energy load. This could lead to rolling blackout this summer. If summer 2012 is as brutal as 2011 was then Austin residents have much more to worry about than electric prices, they will need to worry about the more vulnerable the elderly and indigent loosing power all together. If it happens at 1pm on a day that's 104 outside, lives will be in serious jeopardy. Getting off coal is my goal. I definitely support it. Looking forward I would like to see more utilization of solar power. I would like to see private/public cooperation with Dell, Exxon, or Home Depot to provide small solar systems to needy homes. These won't be big enough to run a house on, but they will provide enough of a charge to keep the fridge and fan running. And keeping food fresh or a loved one cool during a blackout will be worth the effort. This could be expanded to include large solar arrays on top of AISD local high schools. The solar panels will keep schools open and functioning during blackouts and during the summer months when the schools are not in use they will provide much needed electricity into the city's grid.
